

### NEWSLETTER NO. 31 MAY 2016

#### Membership statistics (record date 31<sup>st</sup> March 2016):

- Doctoral candidates with membership in total: 398
- 350 doctoral candidates not working within a programme
- 48 doctoral candidates working within one of the five incorporated programmes (candidates of the doctoral programme for Theology are listed depending on whether they work within a programme or individually)
- 342 members are doctoral candidates at the Faculty of Humanities.
- 51 members are doctoral candidates at the Faculty of Theology.
- 5 members are scholarship holders or associates of the incorporated programmes or doctoral candidates of the Cotutelle-Procedure but are doctoral candidates at other faculties or universities.
- 97 members do not have German nationality
- Gender relation: 167 males, 231 females
- The doctoral candidates ("Junior members") are supervised by 371 "Senior members", 204 of which are members of University of Göttingen.

In the first quarter of 2016, 19 members of the GSGG were awarded their doctorate; 16 at the Faculty of Humanities and three at the Faculty of Theology.

# **b)** Translation and Transformation in the Age of Revolution (1750-1850), 23<sup>rd</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> June 2016 Third conference of the network U4 "<u>Reverberations of Revolution: Political Upheaval Seen From</u> <u>Afar</u>"; in cooperation with the junior researcher groups of the GSGG <u>Multiple Modern</u>. The category of revolution is itself a product of translation, from Latin to French, English, German etc. What is more, without translations the reception of revolutionary events would have been impossible in a transnational public sphere. In spite of this, the impact of translations has been largely ignored in standard historical accounts of the Atlantic revolutions. The reception of revolutionary events, based on the translation of eyewitness accounts and revolutionary pamphlets, inspired new upheavals on both sides of the Atlantic. The medial conditions involved transnational networks of translators, many of them female. Hence a transatlantic public sphere, in which revolutionary narratives were disseminated, emerged to a high degree through practices of translation.
